


# **Peggy Benton**

#### **CHORUS HISTORY**

## **Fairbanks Frontier**

**Fairbanks Frontier Chorus** was chartered in 1965 with 12 members. The cost was \$6.00 each to International and Gen Sole was the first director.

Quartets: "Arctic Association" won first place in Region 13-1979 and "Alaska Gold" won first place in Region 13-1985.



**Fairbanks Chorus** has done a Community Christmas show every year since 1990. Sadly, 2020 will be the first year for NO Christmas show for over 30 years.

**Fairbanks Chorus** represented the State of Alaska in the "Festival of States" in 2005. The chorus had a personal tour of the Senate with Senator Ted Stevens, sang at monuments in Washington DC, and sang the "Alaska State Flag" song on the steps of the Capital.

**Fairbanks Chorus** enjoyed a 7-day southeast Alaska tour in 2009 for the celebration of 50 years of Alaska Statehood. The chorus entertained in Sitka, Ketchikan, Juneau, Haines, and traveled by bus and ocean-going ferries.

**Fairbanks Chorus** has done a huge fund-raiser, held in February bi-yearly since 2009. It is called "The Ice Fog Frenzy" and has raised major funds to help chorus members attend competition.

Elaine Jacobson served as "Regent of Region 13" for several years and was treasurer for over 5 years. Carol Ann Varner was Chapter at Large Coordinator for 3-4 Years.

**Fairbanks Chorus** is mostly responsible for the "Open Division" category. The chorus kept taking parodies to competition. The judges did not know how to judge us. 2010 was the year one of the judges said, "Fairbanks keeps winning the <u>Audience Choice award</u>. Is there any way we can make a category for those who want to entertain rather than do the traditional competition?" Open Division happened the next year.

**Fairbanks Frontier Chorus** is the oldest chorus in the State. We just celebrated 55 years of Sweet Adelines being active in Fairbanks.

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#### **Jet Cities**

The Jet Cities Chorus was founded on July 3, 1962, by a group of 23 women, drawing from Seattle, Tacoma and other distant locales. We are currently based in Federal Way, Washington, and have approximately 40 members, ranging from twenty-somethings to octogenarians.



The chorus has placed first in regional competition four times, and has competed internationally in Kansas City, KS, Detroit, Honolulu, and Indianapolis. We also competed one time at Harmony Classic in Greenville, SC.

The chorus has had ten directors over the years, some for just a short time, others for a decade or more. Our current director, Rachel Pack, became our director in 2019 and brings vitality and inspiration to our chorus. She recently sang tenor with the **Renegade** quartet, placing 8th internationally in 2018, and received the Region 13 Novice Director Award in 2019. She teaches choir at Maple Valley High School in Maple Valley, Washington, as well as co-directing at "Harmony Explosion Northwest", a three day event for young men and women ages 13 to 25. We appreciate her dedication, as well as her joy of spiders, which find their way into rehearsals and contest preparations (plastic versions only)!

During this time of quarantine, our Music Team developed virtual rehearsals that include physical warm-ups, vocal warm-ups, motivational activities and...singing! The chorus undertook a virtual concert of "Harmonize the World", and is now collaborating on tags using a program called "BandLab". Rachel has also been teaching music theory online to members who are interested, covering basic theory as well as more in-depth topics related to arranging music, barbershop style! Members contribute to our rehearsals by taking turns providing inspirational thoughts, leading warm-ups, and offering solo performances.

We end each rehearsal by singing "Harmonize the World", followed by our cheer, "Jet Cities Rocks!" which our past team leader, Sue Pisek, has taken to heart by painting hundreds of rocks

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which we take and place in the public domain. Some of them have resulted in the finders contacting us and coming to shows!

We are adapting to this new state of "distance" singing, but look forward to all singing together again, with our own chorus and the rest of our Sweet Adelines sisters!

## **Seattle Shores**



1953

Seattle Shores Chorus was officially chartered in 1953. According to Opal Hicks, a charter member with the chorus, in March 1951 Opal and her husband attended a barbershop show put on by the Seattle Men's Chapter of SPEBSQSA (Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America).

During intermission, a woman named Grace Doyle announced from the stage that a local chapter of a women's singing group called

Sweet Adelines was forming, and all women were invited to attend. Opal's husband told her to write down the phone number. She called and subsequently attended a Tuesday evening rehearsal attended by a half dozen women. She decided to try the baritone part.

It took the group a year and a half to meet the requirements to charter with Sweet Adelines International. The charter was presented on May 4, 1953, by Dr. Sigmund Spaeth of New York City, noted musicologist and arranger of "Sweet Adeline," which was the organization's official theme song for several years. At that time they officially became known as the Seattle Chapter of Sweet Adelines. The chorus, which started with about 21 members, kept busy with rehearsals, performances, and competitions from 1953 to 1980. Seattle Chapter was also instrumental in helping several other choruses become established in the Seattle area.

In 1980, the leaders of the **Seattle Chorus** and the **Northshore Chorus** decided to combine forces
and become **Seattle Shores Chorus**.

**Seattle Shores** won the Sweet Adelines regional competition in 1988, going to Miami for the international competition.

In 2007, the chorus sang for audiences including heads of state in Jamestown, Virginia, for the 400th

Today we still celebrate our anniversary on May 4, and we still rehearse on Tuesday nights. We have come a long way! And always welcome new members.

And we're looking forward to the day when the masks **Song of Seattle** is wearing will be our cabaret masks once again!

# **Spirit of Spokane**

The **Spirit of Spokane Chorus** became an official chapter of Sweet Adelines in 1989 (under the name of **Spokane Falls Chorus**) and won the regional Small Chorus Championship with only 20 members in our very first year of competition. Since that time, the chorus has maintained a commitment to excellence as we have grown in the number of singers and in experience. With expert coaching and several years of gifted direction by Mike Elliott, the chorus exploded into the winners' circle for the first time on April 4, 1998, with a performance that brought the Spokane Opera House audience to its feet, even before the last note was sung. This entitled us to compete at Sweet Adelines International competition in Atlanta, Georgia in fall 1999, where we placed in the top 20 in the world. In 2000, we repeated the regional win, scoring high enough to be one of the top five mid-sized choruses in the world! This gained the chorus an invitation to IES in San Antonio Texas in July 2001 where we placed second.

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The women of **Spirit of Spokane Chorus** have proven that these awards were not a flash in the pan with three more regional championships in 2002, 2004 and 2006. We enjoyed our journey to International competition in Calgary, Alberta, Canada in October 2007; we opened the performing chorus to Sweet Adelines in our regional area and nearly doubled the number of members on stage. More recently, our competition results include first place for a mid-size chorus and placements among the top four choruses over-all.



But we aren't only about competition! We are a high-level performing chorus who is also on a joyful, musical journey. We perform for community events and produce original stage shows every year. We have performed as elves, as ghosts, as hobos, and as kids at a slumber party. We dress up in glitter, in neon colors and in basic black. Our performances will make you laugh, make you cry, and make you remember by-gone days. Last fall we celebrated our 30th anniversary with a huge show. All five of our local Barbershop choruses were on stage together singing our hearts out!

Through this period of pandemic, **Spirit of Spokane** is continuing to offer a virtual experience for our members through our Zoom online format. We meet each week to learn new songs, visit with guest coaches, and learn from a variety of online video content. We are currently in the process of creating a virtual chorus video and are looking forward to a time when we can get together again to blend our voices in beautiful Barbershop harmony...the true **Spirit of Spokane**.

# WHAT IT TAKES TO MAKE REGIONAL CONVENTION HAPPEN

 ${f W}$ ell, simply put, **it takes a small army**.

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establishing a workable budget and a schedule for convention week. This team consists of 5 members: Chair of the Regional Convention (CRC), Competition Chair (CC), Communications Chair (CoC), Facility Event Specialist (FES) and Official Panel Liaison (OPL). Starting in October, the team has monthly Zoom meetings up to the month before convention and then meets Wednesday of convention week for a final touch base.

Under each team member there are many subchairs, helpers, volunteers, etc. The CRC oversees the whole event and is responsible for any items not directly related to the Competition: site selection, registration, classes, Harmony Emporium, Thursday Night Kickoff, Show of Champions, Afterglow, transportation and photographer (both shared with the CC), etc.

The CC handles all things competition: quartet and chorus contest schedules, contest stage and backstage items, riser configuration, sound check, briefings, inspection, video and audio recordings, webcast, traffic patterns, lighting, ticket sales, emcees, award presenters, door monitors, busing, etc.

The CoC manages communications for the convention: webpages, bulletins, eBlasts, InTune, convention logo, program, after convention survey, etc.

The FEC coordinates all onsite management: space for convention events, sleeping rooms, catering, equipment needs, seating, etc.

The OPL is responsible for all activities relating to the official Judging Panel: primarily the care and comfort of the panel, transportation, housing, meals, trial scorers, contestant packet envelopes, inspections, briefings, etc.

So as you can see, there is a lot that goes into making Regional Convention happen. The basics are listed above but trust me, there is so much more that space doesn't allow. The list goes on!
