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### **Music Choices for Contest**

Another successful regional contest is over. Now we start planning for *next* year!

I heard from several groups this year that the music judge commented on the suitability of the arrangement to the performer. Sometimes, this seems to be the bane of our existence. One of the biggest mistakes choruses and quartets make is picking music that shows what they can't do well, rather than pick songs that show what they can do well.

When selecting music, I suggest steering clear of songs done on the international contest stage. That probably sounds harsh; however, it's likely the songs sound great and are done well because they are done by groups that sing in the high B+ to A scoring level. These groups make songs seem easy even when they aren't. Most songs performed at International are difficult, whether it sounds like it or not. If you really like a song you heard there, look for an easier arrangement. Often, multiple arrangements of the song can be found.

One good way to find music is to go directly to the arrangers. Write them a note giving them your singable ranges for each voice part. Include information like: "Our bass doesn't do well on notes lower than a D," or "Our tenor gets vocally fatigued if she's on D or higher for extended periods," or "Our baritone is more successful when she's below the lead." Let the arranger know your scores for the last couple of contests, along with the

songs you did and the fact that your judges said the music was too difficult for your group. Ask for suggestions from their arranger's list. You will find most arrangers are more than willing to help you locate an arrangement that will help you succeed. And they'll be honest with you because they want their arrangements to be done well, too.

Not to toot her horn, but Nancy Bergman's site is a GREAT resource. If you look at her alphabetical listing of songs, she indicates which are contestable, along with skill level. There are other sites out there for finding music; I've just personally found Nancy's is the most user friendly. You can find all of our organization's arrangers on the international web site at the **Arrangers Contact** Search link. If you find something you want to sing, ask the arranger if the song would be good for "x" level chorus or quartet.

Also, look for songs that don't have a rangy lead line. When this is the case, the other parts become rangy to accommodate the melody. Songs to consider should have a lead line that does not have vocal gymnastics inherently in the tune, like "Once Upon A Time" or constant jumps from low-range to high-range, like "Crying Myself to Sleep." Once the lead line starts playing gymnastics, so does the baritone line and then you end up with separated voice chording on the tenor and bass lines. Higher level groups can be more success

ful with this, but it is still risky to undertake.

Another thing to consider is the group itself. Does the music fit your style and personality? Is it ageappropriate? Does it fit the message you're trying to portray? Take, for example, "Once Upon A Time." I recently saw a young men's quartet sing this and could not buy into the sell of the song coming from 20-yearolds... I mean, what would they know? How about a young women in harmony quartet singing "I've Been Waiting for Your Phone Call for 18 Years," or a more "experienced" quartet singing "It's Raining on Prom Night"? The songs just don't fit! The message has to be believable from the group selling it. Unless, of course, you are doing something for comedic effect—that is an option and can be successful if approached correctly.

Remember, you don't have to do a ballad and an uptune. You can do a swing tune and ballad or swing and uptune or two uptunes. The point is, do what you do best! Pick easier music you can spice up with the help of a coach who knows your abilities.

There is more to picking music than selecting a song you've heard someone else do. Be selective and smart!

### **Monaco**

Want a better score? Try some bedtime reading! When the award for Most Improved Quartet was announced, the reaction from many in the audience was, "HOW MANY?" (for the record, it was 134 points!).

How did we do that?! Two years ago, we realized we simply didn't know how to compete. Jim Arns told us about *With Winning in Mind,* by Lanny Basham. We applied the advice from this book individually and collectively. We always use positive reinforcement now. In the pattern up to stage time, we adopted the "Focus Zone" approach and that really worked. We've learned that good mental preparation is *vital*.

We worked a lot on our blend and did lots of



exercises; the "non-leads" learned the lead line. The judges advised us to transfer that sound into other areas of the song. Who knew you had to do it from the start to end of a song and not just parts of it?"

Monaco has been together for three years and feels the new approach has changed us for the better. "We no longer work harder—we work smarter; also, we take the music seriously, but not ourselves" says Misti. Sounds like good advice for us all.

# Judges' Feedback is Instructional Chorus and Quartet Trends can Guide Education

How do we know what type of education is needed in our Region? Every year I meet with the panel of judges immediately following the Chorus Contest and they provide comments regarding the overall Quartet and Chorus Contests, as well as suggest areas of needed focus. Appropriate workshops, individual chorus visits, and convention classes are then planned around the areas of focus. Below are the comments received in each category.

### **CHORUS CONTEST**

### Sound - Kim Hulbert

- Breathing is still an issue at B- level.
- Instant accuracy is not being achieved in intervals, tuning, synchronization, and vowel production. Continued resonance issues.
- Barbershop balance is mostly good; sometimes really good!
- Good energized vocal line, but need more tone flow, dynamic flexibility and vocal style.
- Fine-tuning and instant accuracy remain issues at all levels.
- Stamina: many choruses start well on song #1 but end up significantly lower on song #2.
- Better choruses than quartets; all upper level.

### Music - Jana Gutenson

- Good vocal skills, your work shows.
- Concentrate on musical unity.
- Dynamics: work for more contrast that is delivered fluidly.
- Great contest: all but one B- and above.
- Some questionable song choices, but overall good match between chorus and music.
- Unity and interval rhythmic delivery (words) caused chords to be misaligned, even in top choruses. Director education is needed on skills to get all singers to deliver their well-intentioned plans more precisely.

### Expression - Paula Davis

- Great contest!
- Great job: almost all in B levels!
- Lovely expressive plans here today.
- Expression is a strength for you in the choruses.
- Develop freedom, energy and

emotional involvement to move into B+ levels; a bit too technique driven.

- Stamina development will help every level.
- Synchronization issues are in almost every group; head toward pulse and move it with air.

### Showmanship - Tori Postma

- Good vocal skills; keep strengthening
- Increase energy
- Focus more on characterization
- Good work on entrance/break, costume, makeup, choreography and creativity.
- Generally a good grasp of this category. The way to increase energy is by strengthening the vocal foundation, so the emotion and passion are carried by the music and the visual plans are then easily added and truly enhance the overall plan.
- Some good use of humor in this contest.
- Major focus should be vocal foundation and then energy and characterization.

### **QUARTET CONTEST**

### Sound - Kim Hulbert

- Large gap in levels an issue
- Synchronization needs to be addressed
- Instant accuracy: every chord, every singer, every time
- Vowel resonance: match vowels but also match resonance

### Music - Jana Gutenson

- Thank you for an excellent group of emcees!
- Need work on harmony accuracy
- Tempo: add pulse/backbeat
- Phrasing: need to work on "ad lib" interpretation
- What an enjoyable contest!
- Encourage pitch-taking to solidify starts of songs. Many groups didn't really lock into key center until the chorus of the song after a shaky introduction or verse.
- Develop resources for teaching interpretation skills that include ad lib style in ballads and backbeat pulse in tempo songs.
- · Address fine tuning as it relates to

interval accuracy at all levels

 Many song choices were too difficult for the performer.

### Expression - Paula Davis

- Encourage quartets to take a pitch. Why risk a shaky start?
- Many synchronization issues. Build

   focus on pulse rather than words in
  uptune, 2) rhythmic breathing as a
  unit, and 3) stamina and breath
  management
- Expressive plans mostly good. Yea!
- Energy, character, and emotional communication in beginning stages for most.
- Consistent energy needs development; what is it and how to have it.
- Most still need vocal skill development, although it's apparent they've begun the journey
- 12 out of 19 in C levels

### Showmanship - Tori Postma

- Vocal skills mostly good
- Energy: keeping it consistent is the challenge
- Entrance/break generally good; some too slow
- Costume: mostly good work
- Makeup and grooming good
- · Creativity: could use more
- A couple of quartets had unfortunate starts because they omitted pitch taking on stage.
- Some need musical foundation work before they can explore characterization further, but everyone can take characterization further.
- Energy consistency is the key for most to improve, and maintaining it as a unit.

Many of the aforementioned areas will be addressed in our upcoming Director/Faculty/Music Leaders workshop with International Faculty, Dede Nibler. Read about this workshop on the front page of *InTune*. Also, our scheduled Area Schools will help these issues.
