Regional Assessment Increased

On November 23, 2010, all chorus financial coordinators/treasurers and team leaders/ presidents were notified of an annual regional assessment increase that becomes effective May 1, 2012. The advanced notice of more than a year is to help choruses plan for the increase, especially those using an accrual/escrow method for collecting membership dues.

Currently, dues are \$25 for chapter/chorus members and \$35 for chapter-at-carge members and will remain the same for the assessment in May 2011.

Beginning in 2012, the annual assessments will be as follows:

Member Type	As of 05/01/12	Total Increase
Chapter/Chorus Member	\$36.00	\$11.00
Chapter-at-Large Member	\$48.00	\$13.00

The members of your Regional Management Team (RMT) struggled with this decision, knowing increased costs are never welcome. It will have been seven years since the last time regional assessments were increased and it is necessary now to keep pace with the costs of providing high quality events and conducting the business of this wonderful organization. Please be assured the RMT continually looks at the way it does business and initiates new ideas and improvements to use regional funds wisely.

Eight Years in the Making: Shared Past of Two MENC/SAI Award Winners Add Up to Incredible Odds

While thousands of Sweet Adelines cheered for Anne Kotch-
man when she received the Music Educatorstwo years in
a row at the
historic FoxNational Conference/Sweet Adelines International
(MENC/SAI) Award at the 2010 International Competition,
one Region 13 member was beyond excitement!Theater in
Detroit!

Judie Sharpe, <u>Grand Olympics Chorus</u> director, not only relived *her* moment of glory when she won the same award years ago, but got to cheer on personal friend, fellow coach/teacher and former chorus mate as she accepted the award last fall.

The MENC/SAI Award is a national and international award for the Music Educator/Teacher of the Year.

What the audience didn't know is that Anne and Judie at one time lived in the same community, sang in the same chorus, taught music at neighboring schools and coached the same international-winning Young Women In Harmony (YWIH) quartets before becoming MENC/SAI award winners. Today, Anne and Judie live on opposite ends of the United States: Anne in Michigan and Judie in Washington.

The two first crossed paths in Michigan in 2002 when Anne joined <u>Shoreline Sound Chorus</u>, where Judie had been a member for three years. At the time, Judie was the regional YWIH coordinator and had been teaching YWIH methods in her classroom.

"It was like lighting a fire under my music program, and my students responded with great excitement," Judie says. "We began filling our auditorium for choir concerts with highly enthusiastic audiences."

Inspired by this success, fellow music teacher, Anne, began using similar materials to teach her students. Anne taught high school choir at Cardinal Mooney Catholic High School in Marine City and Judie taught high school choir for the Richmond School District. As it turned out, the two schools were about a half-hour's drive away from each other!

Anne says, "I was so impressed with the work Judie did with her students and the YWIH program for our region! She gave so many young women incredible experiences and opportunities. She was a tremendous help to me when I began my YWIH chorus at my high school. We were preparing to be on our chapter (Shoreline Sound) Christmas show and Judie came and spent the whole day with us, coaching. It made such a difference."

"The education that the YWIH program provided enriched my choir in so many ways," Anne says. "As a result, we had so many performance opportunities, including singing backup to Kenny Rogers in his "Christmas and Hits" show two years in a row at the historic Fox Theater in Detroit! These opportunities have been life-altering for my students!" In 2002,

Judie won the MENC/ SAI award. Two years previously,

her YWIH quartet, Sandstone, won SAI's Rising Star competition. Judie says of the experience, "It was a highlight of my life...and theirs! One of those girls is now a music teacher herself, passing her love of music to the next generation."

Around the same time, Judie worked with another YWIH quartet in the area, Dreamcatchers. As it turned out, the school teacher for that quartet was none other than Anne.

As the years passed, Anne and Judie worked together coaching YWIH quartets until Judie retired and moved to Washington in 2006. Dreamcatchers stayed together after Judie retired, and, through Anne's continued hard work, placed 3rd at the 2008 Rising Star contest. In addition, the two women watched as other quartets they formed and coached went on to win at the regional level. Anne has also seen a former student and YWIH quartet member become a music teacher in one of the local schools.

"Judie was a wonderful coach and friend," Anne recalls. "I was honored and humbled to take over as YWIH coordinator for the region when she relocated to Washington."

Of their tied pasts, Judie says, "I just think that it is so exciting that two friends from the same chorus, working with the same high-placing YWIH quartets, have received this same fabulous award!"

Say What?!? Tips for Expressive Singing

When a performance has complete command of the technical elements of singing and then adds emotional communication—making the audience unaware it is hearing anything other than a beautiful song straight from the heart —the performers have achieved the ultimate: true musical expression.

Here are some things to help identify the key elements in a song's emotive message:

Write out the lyrics in script. Pay attention to how long it takes you to write the words and what words seem to tug at your heartstrings. Those will be important words.

Notice the musical plan. Regardless of the words, notice what shape the musical line takes, what notes are held a long time, what notes are high, or what musical embellishments are present. Composers and arrangers use these musical elements to highlight the story they want to tell.

Sing the melody line. Sing it on a neutral vowel and notice where the melody seems to be effortlessly drawn out.

Do any of these elements line up? See if the important words, long notes, high notes, and interesting musical embellishments line up. These will become musical climaxes that help to give the piece ebb and flow.

Using these tips, make a musical and interpretive plan. Every piece should have the shape of an arc, where the highest point is at or near the end. Some words, notes and phrases can be moved through, while others need to be extended for emotional impact.

An emotional story should be imprinted upon the words and music. Draw on personal experiences as guides for the emotions you think you would feel during the song. If personal experiences are not possible (for whatever reason) then

substitute something else.

Use your face and body to convey the message of the song. If you sing a happy song with a blank face, you are not helping to sell the emotional story. Likewise, if you have extraneous body movement, it will interfere with a solemn song.

Lastly, realize that only **after** the basic technical elements of performance are achieved is it truly possible to attain a passionate performance, with complete commitment to the lyrical and musical message.

However, always strive to master the basics so you can move your listeners with what you sing.

Our Changing Lives... The only person who likes change is a baby!

All of these things result in changes in your life, but as the title of this article says, the only person who likes change is a baby. This is unfortunate because change in your life is **inevitable**. It will happen and it will happen more often than you would like.

The real question is "How do you respond to change?" Do you go with the flow or do you resist? Do you give suggestions for improvement or do you just complain? The book Who Moved My Cheese?, by Spencer Johnson, is a wonderful parable about how people (or in this case, mice) respond to change. It describes the adventures of Sniff, Scurry, Hem and Haw as they deal with unexpected change. Their cheese (something they want) is moved to a different place in the maze and they are faced with the dilemma of continuing to come back to their same old spot (where there is no more cheese) or choosing to move on to a different spot (to find cheese!).

Each mouse takes a different approach to this hunt and each has a different attitude during their adventure. Scurry immediately runs around blindly looking for new cheese. Sniff also immediately starts looking for cheese but does it more cautiously. Hem and Haw drag their feet, complain about the lack of cheese but do not take any steps to improve their situation.

Which character are **you**? If you are having a difficult time dealing with change in your life, this quick-read book is for you. It will help you gain insight into how you currently deal with change and how you could improve your hunt for "the cheese".

It might be your cheese is still there; you just need an attitude adjustment to be happy with what you have. Or, it could be that your

cheese has indeed left and you need to find a new supply (new job, new friends, whatever). You'll enjoy reading *Who Moved my Cheese?* and discovering for yourself if you



are a Sniff, Scurry, Hem or Haw.

The Performer Prepares

Did you ever wonder what is different about powerful performers? The book, <u>The</u> <u>Performer Prepares</u>, by Robert Caldwell, gives an insight into the mind of a successful performer.

Caldwell says, "In addition to technical achievement, how a person feels about her music, herself and everything on stage are also important for performance excellence." Isn't that what we all are striving for: the pursuit of musical excellence?

A performer's inner experiences directly affect their technical execution. Yes, the voices in your head really do matter! It's up to **you** to be sure that your inner voices are using positive language to build you up, not negative language to tear you down.

Top performers are conflict-free at the time of their performance. They are able to direct the inner voices and commit their energy to what they are doing at that moment—giving the performance of their life. Performers who have inner conflicts while on stage will meet with interference and that interference blocks them from their peak performance. A performer needs to be organized on the inside to completely commit to what they are doing.

Caldwell gives some practical guidelines for improving performance:

- If your performance is riddled with conflicts, you will need to resolve the conflicts.
- If your performing lacks qualities you can commit to, then you will need to develop qualities worth committing to.
- If your performing is colorless and limp, then you will need to enrich or enlarge it. (*a la*, "Go Big or Go Home!")

By releasing the negative and embracing the positive, you can learn to fill your musical experiences with what is special to you. It will help you reach your technical goals in the process. Let your personality shine without letting the nerves and fear inhibit you. Let go and your audience will love you for it.
