## What is “Breath”?

I’ve been having an interesting time recently learning about “breath” and more importantly, the spaces into which one “breathes.” I want to talk about two closely related constructs: *when* do you breathe and *where* do you breathe

(*who, what* and *how* are left for another discussion).

First concept I want to think about is *when* do you breathe? For many singers, the answer is simple – you breathe at a rest in the music. After all, a common view is that a rest in the sheet music is where the author of the music said, “It’s okay to breathe here.”

But that’s not the purpose of the rest in the sheet music. The purpose of that rest is to provide a pause in the music. It might be for emotional impact, it might be to keep tempo, it might be there to provide an opportunity for a differentiation between parts, and it might even be to allow a singer an opportunity to “tank up” before a particularly long phrase. But it’s most likely that the rest is there for the emotional pause.

And that’s a key insight: The rest that you see in the music is NOT FOR THE SINGER. It’s not there because the composer/arranger decided to take it easy on you; it’s there because he or she decided there was an emotional element that needed to be explored at the point of the rest.

But if the rests aren’t for breath, when am I supposed to breathe?

Well, the answer is simple: Breathe at the rest. But as you breathe, be mindful of the intent of the piece. If the emotional tone of the piece at the rest is quiet or contemplative, you should take a slow and gentle breath that preserves (and may increase) the emotional impact. A big tank-up breath is going to be visible to the audience and it’s going to break the emotional element you’re trying to project.

## “Breath” Continued

The #1 thing to keep in mind when you decide to take a breath is: What effect will this breath have on the phrase? Is there a way I can change how I breathe to ensure that the dramatic effect of the rest is preserved?

The next concept to consider about breathing is *where* do you breathe? This concept closely relates to the first concept. When thinking about where you breathe, there are two transitions to consider: the transition between the last note in the previous phrase and the rest, and the transition between the rest and the next phrase. When you breathe, you make a choice about whether the breath closes a phrase (in the first transition) or opens a phrase (in the second transition). To preserve forward motion (and we almost always want to preserve forward motion), it's important for a breath to be attached to the next phrase. Your breath sets up the emotion of the next phrase, so it shouldn't be the end of the previous phrase.

Unlike the idea of measuring your breath by the emotional intent of the rest, this concept is a bit hard to explain, but it's easy to see if you think about it as you're singing. For me, when I started to breathe, I thought about the emotion of the next phrase, not the emotion of the last phrase.

In the song “*Baby It's Cold Outside*”, one such transition point happens in the first verse. The lead line is: “So really I'd better scurry” <half rest> “Well maybe just half a drink more.” Note that there's an emotional transition between “I'd better scurry” and “Well maybe” – when you breathe, you need to breathe as if you're starting to change your mind, NOT as if you're deciding to leave. Choosing to breathe as if it closes a sentence ruins the emotional impact of the rest.

By noticing the two concepts I'm presenting here (*when* you breathe and *where* you breathe), you can bring a new level of musicality to your singing.

## Can We Really Trust Those Judges?!

I attended Beth Smith's class at SET on judging. (If you didn't make it to this class this year, be sure to do it next year because it was fantastic!)

There was a discussion on how judges hear the difference between 56 and 57, and how sometimes one judge can be 10 points higher than another judge in another category. It got us thinking: can we really trust those judges?!

In short: ABSO-POSOLUTELY!

Judges go through rigorous, intense training!

Once you get accepted into the judging program (a small victory in itself), you then spend a lot of your own money flying to different regions trial scoring their competitions. Following that, the judge in your category AND the panel chair review your scores and ask your reasoning behind scores they find fault with. You trial score until you do it right—every time!

You are eventually asked to trial score at International: ALL of the contests. And your scores have to match with 100% precision. (By the way, that's over 236 scores!)

Once you do this satisfactorily, you can then be sent out to judge. Before each contest you review the leveling tapes as a panel, and discuss the identifying marks of each level. After every contest the category specialists review the tapes of every regional contest and compare the scores they were given with what they should have received. If a judge's scores are not within the accuracy range, they will ask you to continue with further training.

With these kinds of safeguards in place, I assure you we CAN trust the judging

system. And we can remember that inconsistency in our skill can lead to inconsistent scores. The judges are on our side, and are trying to give us a fair representation of our performance that day.

With this in mind, let's welcome judges Mary Rhea, Jana Gutenson, Marcia Pinvidic, and Mindi Brizendine warmly when we see them at contest, May 16-19, 2013 in Spokane!

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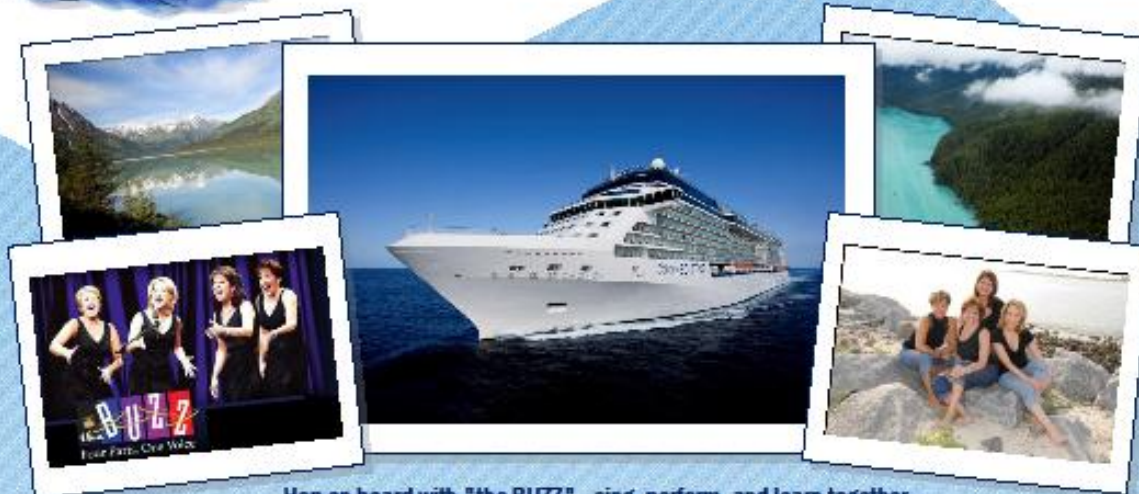

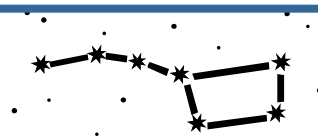

Standing rules are what make your chapter unique and address your chapter's way of doing business (as long as the standing rules are not in conflict with the bylaws). Each chapter may adopt, waive, rescind, or amend its own standing rules.

Regional standing rules require that the Regional Team Coordinator review chapter standing rules periodically and that changes to chapter standing rules be approved. Please contact me if I can be of any help. I look forward to reviewing your updated chapter standing rules. And I also look forward to learning about all the joy you are bringing to your community in 4-part harmony!

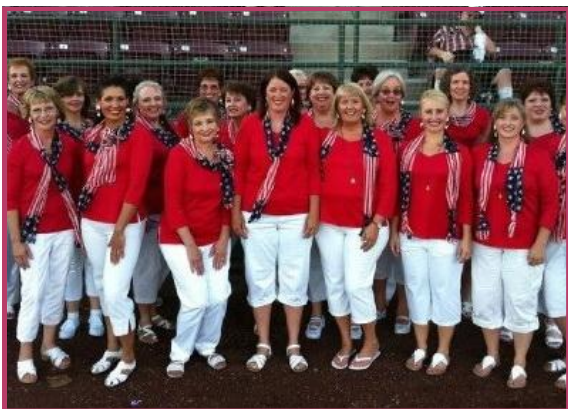
