Focus on Director Education

I was once asked by a member of a small chorus, "Where can WE find a

wonderful director?" My response to her was "grow the one you have." Many of our outstanding front line directors have come from the risers. Very, very few directors walk in the door with the personality, people skills, musical knowledge, and barbershop experience we need to help our choruses reach their full potential.

So how does a chorus "grow their own?" The simple answer is "invest in her and invest in your chorus." Invest ongoing time, money, and support.

Begin by communicating with her and then following through with her and for her. Help her understand where the chorus is in their development and where the chorus wants to go. Help her understand where she is in her development and where she wants to go. Are these goals in alignment? Where are the gaps? What can be done to fill those gaps?

There are so many wonderful resources in the Sweet Adelines International organization. Use them all. Use the International and Regional websites; use the Regional and International competitions; use the Regional programs and

resources; use your local resources; go outside your boundaries to find the right resources to help the chorus and the director (get outside the box).

Ways for your front-line director to grow:

- Attend a coaching session of another chorus
- Request a Region 13 Director Buddy (contact Nancy Kurth, Director Coordinator)
- Attend the Sunday Morning Breakfast with the Judges following the Regional Competition (April 12) which is open to all Region 13 front line directors (not only competing directors)
- Attend Harmony College Northwest June 19-21, 2015 in Tacoma, WA (many, many wonderful director classes are available from Regional and International faculty)
- Attend Region 13 SET August 20-23, 2015, which features a half-day specifically for directors only, followed by two full days of a variety of classes to help every member of your chorus (which helps your director)

The list goes on and on. Growing together and celebrating these successes together make for a strong director-chorus relationship—then everyone is happy.

That means that we know that the hotels are packed, restaurants will be crowded, parties will be snug, and WE'RE GOING TO HAVE A GREAT TIME!!!

SCHEDULE. A final schedule will be posted for you all to download and print before you head to Spokane. The same schedule will also be printed in the program, once you pick it up in Spokane.

Care and Feeding of New Members

Welcome and

embrace new members into the chorus. Help them to understand and learn about the organization, that there are Sweet Adelines worldwide. New members are our most valuable asset and resource. Create an atmosphere where people feel accepted, then help them to understand your chorus, who your chorus is. Provide a safe environment; be supporting and loving. Be sure to introduce them to section leaders, administrative people, costume/makeup people.

Ask new members what they need from us such as a big sister, riser buddy, or someone they can ask questions of one-on-one if they need information. Help them to understand the bigger picture. Be sure to introduce them every week.

Consider giving them CDs with handouts of information about chorus life, or sending emails to new members once a week for about 12 weeks with educational information about: vocal production; what is an afterglow, a tag, a stomp, sing out, or performance; what coaching is; and how to use the Regional and International websites. Keep them well informed. Give them a written schedule. Provide them with a laminated card or magnet with the names and phone numbers of people they can call.

Get them to remain a member until they go to their first competition or perform in their first show. Make it exciting and fun. Let them know what to expect: have a new members class, invite them to lunch. Have a sectional potluck with new members—it will make them feel like they are an important part of the section.

We need to be proactive with new members by sending emails before their first show describing what they need to know about the show or competition. Explain what a pattern, wood shedding, and afterglow are. Let them know about the judging categories. After contest or a show, ask them how their experience was, and if there is anything that they would like more information about. Be sure that they attend the First Timers Class at Regional Competition. This will help them understand what it is all about, to see the stage before hand, etc.

The younger generation doesn't commit to things the way we did at that age. Help them to understand what it can bring to their lives. Find out what they need to motivate them, what would bring personal value to them from belonging to our organization.

After they have been a member for a year, ask them what they wish they had known when they joined and use this information for the next group of new members.

So Many Ways to Win!

During our Regional Competition, medals can be won in 17 different categories. And there are

even more ways to "win."

In 2012, Diane Porsch, Master Director of Buffalo Gateway Chorus and Showmanship Judge, listed the following 13 ways of winning with or without actually receiving a medal.

- Meeting your chapter's musical goals for the contest (this could mean merely moving up a half level, or seeing comments about being IN SYNCH instead of out of synch, etc.).
- 2. Singing for Evaluation Only as a point of measuring where we are and what we need to learn.
- Every singer getting off the stage knowing the performance couldn't have been better. (This exhilarating feeling can be accomplished at ANY level.)
- 4. Attending the convention and observing the contests as an educational event.
- 5. Making a conscious effort to mingle with

- members from other chapters and sincerely wishing them well.
- 6. Enjoying the "convention" part of the weekend as well as the "competition."
- 7. Embracing the comments of the judging panel and trusting that the guidance offered is an educational opportunity for the entire chorus.
- 8. Being the upbeat, positive, and confident member that our choruses need us to be.
- 9. Simply enjoying the opportunity to perform, rather than compete, at whatever level we represent this year.
- 10. ENTERTAINING the audience and considering the judges as part of the audience as well.
- 11. Being the best example of a "good sport chorus" regardless of any disappointment that may occur.
- 12. Realizing that six to seven minutes of onstage time does not define who or what we are...
- 13. Having FUN!

Melanie Wroe and Dolores Mode. A world of Sweet Adelines stood by Melanie's side via the "Melanie's Circle" Facebook group, and in many other ways, until her passing October 27, 2014. Melanie grew up a "barbershop brat" with a mother who was a Region 6 championship director, quartet lead, and musical leader. She sang and danced her way through school in various choirs, dance troupes, and theatrical performances, eventually landing back in the world of barbershop when she moved from Fargo to Seattle to attend graduate school to study psychiatric nursing.

Melanie had a superb bass voice and sang in

four internationally-acclaimed choruses and three regional championship quartets. She enjoyed singing with her sister in City of Lakes



Chorus (Minneapolis), while maintaining Chapter at-Large membership in Region 13. Melanie was a Certified Showmanship Judge, a member of the International Faculty, and a highly sought-after educator/coach throughout the organization specializing in visual/vocal presentation, show development, and performance preparation. Dolores is remembered by many for her beautiful smile, gorgeous hair, and kind personality. She had a very versatile voice and sang baritone, tenor, and lead. Dolores organized and directed Harbor Air Chorus for several years and also directed Commencement Bay Chorus.

A New Look for the Show of Champions

following the chorus contest. In response to suggestions by many members, we will kick off this new format this year. Other regions have found this schedule to be very popular with members. It provides a top quality venue for the SOC with the sound and technical staff who produced the contest. It will also cut down on "walking time," since everyone can stay in the INB-PAC for the SOC and then have plenty of time afterwards for dinner. People who are not able to attend the Afterglow will still have an opportunity to celebrate our contest at the SOC.

Our 2015 SOC is expected to last about one hour. Quartets and choruses placing 3rd and 2nd will each sing one song, and the 2015 Champion Quartet and Chorus will do three

songs—not to exceed ten minutes. We encourage groups appearing on the SOC to sing songs that are not a part of their contest package. If a quartet or chorus wins in two categories they will perform one time.

Everyone will be able to enjoy the performances. We will not have a traffic pattern that takes us out of the INB-PAC. Performing choruses will line up quietly along the walls stage right and left. The traffic coordinator will escort choruses backstage to get on stage. We will use a curtain.

Education Class Is Returning To Our Annual Convention & Contest Weekend

There will be an education class for all our Region 13 members on Thursday afternoon, April 9, 3:30-5:00 pm. Your feedback on last year's evaluation form indicated you missed having an educational opportunity at our Annual Convention and Contest. So we are bringing it back.
