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SHINE! 2017 Convention Updates

Judges' comments for Contest 2017

Each contest our judges give us regional score sheets for all the chorus and quartet competitors as a whole. Of course these regional score sheets do not necessarily apply to an individual chorus or quartet, but they do help us as a region focus our education efforts for the coming year. Choruses and quartets may also want to use these regional score sheets in conjunction with their own individual score sheets. You can find a copy of these regional score sheets in the Members Only section of the regional website. After logging on, select the "Documents" tab and click Score Archives from the pull down menu. The direct link to that page is sairegion13.org/ scores.

Here is a summary of what the judges said about the CHORUS competition:

DOING WELL:

- Generally good plans for vocal delivery and breath management
- Vocal skills, especially in higher scoring choruses, but always continue to strengthen or develop further
- Good attempts at characterization; goal now is unity for all singers
- Posture, especially in higher performing levels
- Entrance/break/exit
- · Makeup and grooming

FOCUS EFFORTS ON:

Accuracy, especially in

- "rhythm" tunes, and particularly in break-neck tempos
- Synchronization techniques
- · Breath support
- Supporting foundation garments should be worn by all
- Many costumes were a bit too casual for this venue
- The art of letting go and allowing the performance to be chorus driven
- For lower scoring choruses, focus on:
 - Interval and harmony accuracy
 - chord tuning
 - free resonance
 - understanding the difference between loud volume & true vocal energy
 - the role of a solid lead/ bass match

Here is a summary of what the judges said about our QUARTET competition: DOING WELL:

- 33 quartets! [an all-time high in Region 13]; quartetting in Region 13 is strong
- Overall, most quartets are obviously devoting time and effort in developing their vocal skills
- Good sense of tempo and rhythm
- A lot of very good quartets
- · Generally good posture
- Make up and grooming

FOCUS EFFORTS ON: (FOR ALL QUARTETS)

- Intervals
- Resonance, especially expanding vowel resonance

- Tuning/intonation
- Breathing patterns that don't leave you "air deprived" at the ends of phrases and songs
- Stamina development
- Interpretive planning, dynamics, musical flow, lyrical connection, tone flow
- Letting go of the technique and making the message of the song soar across the footlights
- Consistency in unity delivery
- The "leggings look" is not flattering and distracts from the performance

FOR LOWER PERFORMING QUARTETS

- Tuning to the key
- Harmonizing correctly with each other; harmony accuracy

During an oral debrief with the judges, they shared how much they enjoyed being in our region and complimented us on our handling of such large chorus and quartet contests. They thanked us for our hospitality and our clear love and support for each other.

We've much to celebrate! We are doing so many things well! By using our regional score sheet along with our individual score sheets, we have a map to focus our journey's efforts for the coming year!

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Contest 2018: Everything old will be new!

their Sunday morning breakfast discussion following convention that our contest next year will be held in a new location.

In April we were told we would not have use of the Performing Arts Center in 2018, and would "fall back" to a contracted space in the Convention Center big enough to hold our contest. We knew the space needed to be able to handle/provide the following:

- A stage at least 60' wide, 32' deep, and 3' off the floor to hold our 11 sections of risers.
- Once built, it will need ramps for our competitors to walk up and down.
- Good sound and lighting.
- Break rooms and nearby restrooms for our judg-
- Seating for 1200 people.
- A raised platform (in the audience area) for our official photographer and videographer (required by SAI).

During the 2017 contest weekend, we toured some possible locations. The Convention Center has three ballrooms and the new large exhibit hall (purple on the graphic). The ballrooms were unsuitable (varying ceiling heights, large pillars, too small, etc.) so we "tested out" Section C of the Exhibit Hall space with the help of members from Alaska Sound Celebration,


We announced to the directors and judges attending along with Ryan Heller and Beth Smith. The decision was made that this space could become a very doable contest location for next year.

For those of you who like to plan ahead, here is some more information:

- DoubleTree competitors will still go to the "connector" promenade off the 3rd floor hall, but turn right down the hall (we normally turn left). Check-in will be in the promenade hall.
- Red Lion competitors will again ride buses over. But in 2018, the buses will drive under the Exhibit Hall, and competitors will then walk into the building and take either the elevator, escalator, or stairs up one floor to the check-in point.
- After checking in, Rooms 401 A, B, and C (light blue on the graphic) will be used for photos and warmups before contestants walk through the lobby and hall (yellow on the graphic) to the door outside the stage.
- There will be no curtain in front of the choruses when they move on and off the risers.

The Regional Convention Team will be meeting later in the year in Spokane and will be touring the Exhibit Hall space to make sure our competition runs as smoothly as possible.

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Candy Johnson: She IS Sweet Adelines



The Region 13 Regional Executive Committee (REC) wants to thank **Candy Johnson** for all of her awesome work and boundless energy with the region as Competition Coordinator, Director Mentor, Coach, and most of all, her friendship to all Sweet Adelines. Candy truly is Sweet Adelines!

Candy has been a member of SAI for 42 years! She joined Five Valley Chorus (MT) in 1975, became assistant director in 1977, director in 1983 and a master director in 2006. Under her guidance, the chorus was regional champions in 1984, 1990, 1993, 1995, 2004, 2006, 2008, and 2010. They were the smallest chorus ever on the International stage in 1985 and were on the International stage in 2007 with 111 members! By invitation the chorus sang in Carnegie Hall in 1990, and in 2000 at the Buckeye Invitational Small Chorus Festival in Columbus Ohio. They also performed at the International Choral Festival in Missoula, MT in 2016. According to members of the Five Valley Chorus, she is the heart and soul of their chorus. Candy is a strong educator who finds methods to teach music theory and vocal production in ways all chorus

members can feel and understand.

Candy has sung in many quartets over the years, including Regional Champions Fulltime Enjoyment in 1982; the quartet went on to be semi-finalists in the International Competition in Minneapolis that year. She also sang with Mountain Music Company, the 1990 Regional Champions.

Candy received two appointments from SAI in 1990, as part of the International Faculty and as a member of the Chorus Director Coordinator Group. She has served as faculty for regional workshops across the country, and has read grant applications for the Young Singers Foundation.

Three years after Region 24 was formed in 1984, Candy became the DMA (Director of Musical Activities), a position she held for 10 years. She also was Region 24's Competition Coordinator for 8 years. She served as faculty for Gold Nugget Area Schools, Gold Rush, GO visits across the region, and 24 Karat chorus visits. Candy also coached numerous choruses and quartets across the region. In 1985, she founded Gold Country Chorus, the Region 24 equivalent of Ovation. Candy was awarded the 1993 Rose Achievement Award, which is similar to Region 13's Heart of the Northwest Award.

Candy helped make the transition of Region 24 choruses and quartets into Region 13 by becoming the Competition Coordinator in 2015. She has served as CC in Region 13 for three years, but has decided to retire from that position. She will be missed as she did an awesome job and never seems to get frustrated over any of the last-minute things that can always come up during competition weekend! In 2016, Candy was one of the faculty members for Harmony College NW.

Candy was a music teacher for 25 years and recently retired after 20 year from being a grade school principal! Now she is a full-time Sweet Adeline chorus director, director mentor, and coach. She also plays piano for church every Sunday as well, as directing the church choir, being their wedding organizer, teaching private piano, serving on the Board for Missoula Aging Services, supervising student teachers for the University of Montana, mentoring two teachers at her previous school, and teaching piano classes for adult education. PHEW! She recently added singing with the Gary Gillette Big Band in Missoula, and is a proud member of the University of Montana Alumni Band. Candy is married to a very understanding husband, Calvin. They have a daughter, Barbara, and Candy enjoys every minute she can spend with her two energetic grandsons! Calvin and Barbara are her biggest supporters.


